Olallie Lake Trail #731 Monon Lake Trail #729

Use: Heavy to moderate. Accessible to foot and horse travel only. Length 3 miles (6 including Monon Lake)

Olallie Lake Trail follows the lakeshore, although it is necessary to walk on the road in a few places. Long Lake Trail, at .8 mile, leads east into the Warm Springs Indian Reservation. At 1.1 miles is the Monon-Olallie Trail #732, which connects the Olallie Trail with the Monon Lake Trail #729, should you wish to make the longer loop. At 1.3 miles, Peninsula Campground is entered, with its many small points and bays. Peninsula Campground had some damage from a fire in 2001, but now has all campgrounds open and accessible. Olallie Lake is the largest in the Scenic Area, at 238 acres.

Monon Lake Trail swings to the east from the connecting trail, and follows the deeply bayed shore of Monon back to the meadows on the west side near Road 4220. It is possible to walk back on the road along the west shores of both lakes.

Trail Description

Distances to Points of Interest:

From Paul Dennis Campgrounds:

0.8 miles to Jct. with Long Lake Trail

1.1 miles to Jct. with Monon-Olallie Lake Trail #732 and Nep-te-Pah Lake

1.3 miles to boat ramp and Peninsula Campground

1.7 miles to Camp Ten Campground

2.7 miles to Olallie Lake Guard Station and Resort

2.9 miles back to Paul Dennis Campground-End of trail

Users: This trail is suitable for hikers or horseback riding.

This trail is closed to motor vehicles.

Snow Free Season: Mid-June through September

Description: The Olallie Lake Trail follows the perimeter of Olallie Lake, although it may be necessary to walk on the road for a few short stretches where the banks are steep. The Long Lake Trail intersects at 0.8 miles and leads to several scenic lakes on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation, subject to their regulations. After 1.1 miles a trail past three little lakes connects the Olallie Lake trail with the Monon Lake trail just to the south. Olallie Lake itself is the largest lake in the scenic area at 238 acres in size and 48 feet deep. Olallie Lake lies at the summit of the Cascades at 4936 feet with Mt. Jefferson (10,497 feet) as a beautiful background view from the north shore.

Camping:

Three developed campgrounds are on the shoreline of the lake. Paul Dennis Campground is on the north shore. Camp Ten and Peninsula Campgrounds are on the southern shores of the lake.

Fishing:

Olallie Lake is a popular spot to fish for rainbow trout and brook trout. Fishing is fair to good throughout the summer. Olallie Lake is stocked several times each summer.
